David: I think most people in University Park know you, or at least have seen you and your dog Bear walking around around the neighborhood. How long have you been a resident of North Portland?

John: I've lived in North Portland for twenty three years.

David: I understand that you are on the board of the University Park Neighborhood Association (UPNA). What is your title on the board, and what do you do?

John: Public Safety Coordinator. I volunteer as a liaison between Portland's Office of Neighborhood Involvement (ONI), the Portland Police Bureau, and other public agencies that are committed to the safety and welfare of our citizens. Much of my energy goes into

meeting and greeting neighbors in University Park, offering them insights into basic safety procedures, and connecting them to public resources. Most of us live busy lives, and even so I believe it's necessary for all of us to make the effort to get out and meet our neighbors, take a walk to the park and get to know those who live around us. Fostering community can be the best deterrent to crime. My "safety hat" can also encompass disaster preparedness, as well as encouraging awareness of the cleanliness of our air and the environment around us.

David: As Portland neighborhoods go, how safe is University Park?

John: We live in a relatively safe neighborhood, though crime is an issue throughout the city. Drug use is rampant throughout Portland (and many cities for that matter), and with it comes property crime.

David: What are the most common types of crime in University Park?

John: The most common crime in our area is property theft, which includes car and home invasion.

David: What can the residents do to help make the the neighborhood safer?

John: Take the time to meet your immediate neighbors. Form a Block Watch, and become educated on basic safety measures that can further protect yourself, your family, your property and your neighbors. Report crime as it happens. Call 911 when you witness a crime in action, and 503-823-3333 when you suspect a crime could be occurring. If you notice a crime "after the fact," file an online police report at

portlandoregon.gov/police/cor/

Do not "engage or entice" a potential criminal that you encounter on the street, but rather greet them by saying "Hello!" or "How are you?" Criminals do not want to be noticed.

David: If a group of neighbors wanted to start a Block Watch, how would they go about it?

John: Contact Mark Wells, who is Portland's Crime Prevention Coordinator, at 503-823-2781.

In addition to their full-time positions, Saunders and Hill often work overtime to help ensure safety at Jefferson and Roosevelt High School events, and they spend their days off at Peninsula Lodge, making sandwiches for Neighbors Helping Neighbors to distribute to the houseless. Founded in 2016, EMERJ-SafeNow provides equity-based, traumainformed violence prevention training and education, that starts with the community, builds strong relationships and promotes healthy choices.

EMERJ-SafeNow is a new 501(c)3 nonprofit that aims to provide training and skills to vulnerable communities, rural and urban, that may not have access to resources, skills and education. They provide sessions throughout the year that include training facilitators, workshops, camps and programs in and after school. All sessions offer financial assistance and a sliding scale fee.

EMERJ-SafeNow currently offers workshops for people with different abilities, families, and the LGBTQ community. Any organization can request a workshop or training. Peaceful Warriors Kick'n It for Kids Camp (grades 3-6)

If you want to have fun learning how to defend yourself using martial arts, drama, and games, this week-long self-defense camp is for you. We value peace, and aim to provide participants with important life skills to promote safe communities and healthy choices. Topics include assertive communication, building healthy relationships, intuition, self-care, meditation, as well as physical and non-physical self-defense skills, inner strength and assertiveness in stressful situations such as bullying and harassment. All classes are taught by experienced violence prevention instructors trained to use an equitable, trauma-informed approach to teaching.


These two organizations work together under the umbrella of Northwest Disabilities Support, in order to promote inclusiveness in the community and in education.

John: Yes, to both our Monthly and General meetings.

David: What else would you like to share with our readers?

John: I believe University Park is a special place to live. We are surrounded by the natural beauty of the Willamette River, the often peaceful sense of being somewhat



removed from the City, living out here on the north peninsula. We are blessed with the rich resources of the University of Portland. With growth comes challenges and opportunities, vas our neighborhood develops with residential infill and growing retail establishments.
