An Introduction to Peninsula Odd Fellows Lodge #128

#### Q: What are the Odd Fellows?

A: The Odd Fellows is a fraternal organization like the Elks, Eagles, Masons, and Moose. Fraternal orders are member-based groups that work to improve their communities through various service projects and by raising money for charity.

#### Q: Where did the name Odd Fellows come from?

A: The oldest fraternal orders grew out of the trade guilds, which were the precursor to unions. That is why these organizations were named after professions. These

original fraternities included the Freemasons, the Woodsmen of the World, and the Foresters.

There were many professions, however, that did not have a large enough workforce to form a guild of their own. For them, there was the Odd Fellows. When the Odd Fellows were formed, "odd" simply meant diverse or varied. "Fellows" were workers who were accepted as full-fledged members of their craft.

Today, the the services provided to members by a guild have been replaced by insurance companies, government agencies, and various

social services. In our modern world, Odd Fellows are a diverse group of people coming together to improve their community and care for their neighbors.

#### Q: When did the Odd Fellows come to Oregon?

A: In 1846, a group moving from Boston, Massachusetts to Oregon City, Oregon obtained a charter from the Odd Fellows to establish Oregon Lodge #1. They boarded a ship which traveled down the Atlantic Coast, around Cape Horn, and then up the Pacific coast. For reasons unknown, this ship went way off course and landed in Honolulu instead of Oregon. Deciding that Honolulu was pretty nice, the group from Boston jumped ship, with the charter and established Excelsior Lodge #1, the first Odd Fellows lodge in Hawaii.

Six years later, in 1852, a charter to form an Odd Fellows lodge in Oregon finally arrived. and Chemeketa Lodge #1 was established in Salem, Oregon.

By 1856, Oregon had received charters to start three more lodges. These lodges were located in Portland, Oregon City, and The Dalles. Continued on page 3.

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### An Introduction to Peninsula Odd Fellows Lodge #128, continued

With four established lodges, the Oregon Territory was granted a dispensation to form a Grand Lodge, giving it permission to charter new lodges directly. Given this new authority, Odd Fellows lodges spread rapidly across Oregon.

### Q: When was Peninsula Lodge established?

A: In 1894, the Grand Lodge of Oregon received a petition from twelve well-known businessmen to establish an Odd Fellows lodge in University Park. The petitioners included S.C. Beach, W.A. Wheeler and W.M. Killingsworth.

The petition was granted on December 15, 1894. By that time, there were one hundred and twenty-seven Odd Fellows Lodges in the fledgling State of Oregon. The new lodge in University Park was named Peninsula Lodge #128.

### Q: What is the role of the Odd Fellows in the modern society?

A: On an international level, the Odd Fellows are involved in many charitable causes, with a special focus on promoting education and caring for the sick. The Odd Fellows own and operate low income, assisted living and nursing homes in almost every U.S. state, as well as operating S.O.S. Village, an AIDS orphanage in Cambodia. Odd Fellows provide thousands of scholarships and low-interest student loans every year, and fund eye research at John Hopkins University. Through the Living Legacy Program, the Odd Fellows promotes good environmental stewardship by planting native plants and trees.

On a local level, each lodge is charged with meeting the unique needs of their community. Peninsula Lodge operates as co-op community center, providing low cost classes, and promoting the arts through our community theater and dance programs. Our lodge also offers our building free of charge for use by government agencies, schools, non-profits, and neighborhood associations. Peninsula Lodge also provides financial and volunteer support to several local charities, including Neighbors Helping Neighbors, which provides garbage service and aid to houseless neighbors, and Oregon Food Bank.

### Q: Do different lodges ever work together?

A: Yes. The members of Peninsula Odd Fellows Lodge partner on a regular basis with the members of Mt. Moriah AF&AM which meets twice a month in our building. By working together, Peinnsula and Mt. Moriah are able to raise more money for local charities, and mobilize more volunteers for service projects in and around North Portland.

### Mt. Moriah AF&AM, and Stars of Bethlehem OES An Interview with Robert and Deirdre Neal.

#### Odds & Ends: What is AF&AM?

**Robert:** AF&AM stands for Ancient Free & Accepted Masons, also known as Scottish Rite Masons.

Organized Freemasonry began with the founding of the Grand Lodge of England on 24 June 1717, the first Grand Lodge in the world. Ireland followed in 1725, and Scotland in 1736.

The first Black Masonic lodge was organized in 1787 by Prince Hall, a Revolutionary War veteran. He founded African Lodge number 1 in Boston, which was later renamed African Lodge number 459. This became the first Black self-help fraternal organization in the United States.

**O&E:** Is Mt. Moriah a Prince Hall lodge?

**Robert:** No. Mt. Moriah is under the General Grand Masonic Congress A.F.&A.M. which is headquartered in Washington, D.C. under The United Supreme Council A.A.S.R. (Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite Masons).

In the end, we are all Masons. It doesn't matter if you are Scottish Rite, York Rite, or Prince Hall, as long as you live up to the values of Masonry. We are here to care for the poor, widows and orphans. If you do that, then it shouldn't matter if you are a Black Mason, White Mason, Scottish Rite or York Rite. If I'm ever in need and a Mason offers to help, I'm not going to ask him what kind of Mason he is. I'm going to greet him as a brother and thank him for his help.

**O&E:** Grand Worthy Matron, Can you tell us a little about the Order of he Eastern Stars?

**Deirdre:** According to the history, the Order of the Eastern Star was founded by Dr. Rob Morris in the late 1800's. As a Master Mason, Dr. Morris had the idea that it would be nice to have a way for female relatives of Master Masons to share the benefits of knowledge and self-improvement that Freemasonry made available to men, and to have a place in the Masonic Family that would allow men and women to participate together.

Just like our Masonic Brothers, we are part of the Grand Masonic Congress A.F.&A.M. under the Chapter of the Order of the Eastern Star.

The Stars of Bethlehem Grand Chapter #1 Order of the Eastern Star is adopted under and works with Mount Moriah Grand Lodge of Oregon. We are affiliated under the Supreme Order of the Eastern Star in Boston.

**O&E:** What do Masons and Eastern Stars do?

**Robert:** Masonry teaches that each person has a responsibility to make things better in the world. Most individuals won't be the ones to find a cure for cancer, or eliminate poverty, or help create world peace, but we can all do .omething to help others, and to make things a little better. Masonry is deeply involved with helping people. Masons give more than \$2 million dollars in aid every day in the United States, just to make life a little easier. The great majority of that help goes to people who are not Masons.

Some of these charities are well known, like the Crippled Children's Hospitals and Burn Institutes built by the Shiners. Also, Scottish Rite Masons maintain a nationwide network of over one hundred childhood language disorders clinics, centers, and programs. Each helps children affected by learning or speech disorders.

Some services are less public, like helping a widow pay her electric bill, or buying coats and shoes for disadvantaged children and orphans. With projects large or small, Freemason Lodges and Eastern Stars chapters try to help make the world a better place. If someone over the age of twenty-one is interested in helping others, we encourage them to join. Our goal is to take good men and women and make them better by strengthening their character.
