dance group that would come and entertain the lodge once in a while – the Burley School of Dance. This lady taught out of her garage and would bring in her dancers – one of those little dancers was me!

I remembered dancing upstairs on a big beautiful wood floor, and would never forget the bright pink powder room. To a little girl, it was all so glorious! He loved that I was still carrying on dance in St Johns. I have been lucky enough to continue teaching dance here ever since.

O&E: Why do you teach Tap and Novelty dance?

Linda: I LOVE dance! Upon retiring, Miss Celia Burley, with whom I had been student teaching for years, asked me to take over her dance school.

My goal is to make teaching fun, not strict. I love the power dance brings to an individual! It can help clear your mind, make a tired body come alive, and bring calm to an overwhelmed pace. It just brings simple joy. I also want to produce a well-rounded dance program, and give dancers an opportunity to try many different styles of dance.

O&E: Does Tap and Novelty dance run in your family?

Linda: Yes! I started dance when I was four years old. My mom and grandma loved music and dance with all their hearts. They brought all four of us Butler girls to this wonderful little dance school in St. Johns. My love of dance started in that tiny garage. The amazing Celia Burley taught us tap, Jazz, Charleston, swing, waltz, and salsa, and also to sing 'Barber Shop'!

My grandma (a war seamstress) would sew many a costume for us four girls. I was overwhelmed with joy when I got to start designing some, which I still use to this date!

O&E: Anything else to add?

Linda: We take great pride in sharing our talents in neighborhood Senior Centers. A smile is contagious and a little one in costume, singing a song and tapping a toe, can brighten any day!

Portland Odd Fellows Feed Houseless Neighbors and Provide Garbage Service

Across Portland, Odd Fellows are teaming up to help address issues resulting from the city's houseless crisis.

It is estimated that Portland has nearly 2000 men, women and children living on its streets and in tent camps, creating both a humanitarian and environmental crisis.

When most people think of services for the houseless, they think of the need to provide food and clothing. But there is another service that the housless lack and the housed take for granted – garbage service. Without garbage service, houseless waste becomes unsightly and even dangerous litter.

In order to address this need for garbage service, Peninsula Odd

Fellows member Terrance Moses began visiting houseless camps and hauling away their trash in his own truck and at his own expense. The service he provided was greatly appreciated by the housed and houseless alike. He began receiving donations and eventually founded the service organization Neighbors Helping Neighbors.

Impressed by the work that Terrance was doing, some lodge members began making peanut butter and jelly sandwiches for Terrance to deliver; others assisted in hauling garbage to the city dump.

Peninsula Lodge member Merrilea Manning then spread the idea to other lodges, as well. Partnering with St. Johns Food Share, she established sack lunch crews at the Golden Rule Encampment and Rose City Rebekahs lodges. Among these three lodges, more than two hundred lunches are made each month, to be distributed by Neighbors Helping Neighbors volunteers.

The Odd History of North Portland on Exhibit at Museum Sneak Peak

The St. Johns Museum is holding a sneak peak for the public on Saturday, October 27th, from 10:00 am to 4:00 pm. Peninsula Lodge has been invited to share an exhibit on how the Odd Fellows were instrumental in the founding, growth and prosperity of St. Johns.

In the history of Portland, there has been a total of twenty Odd Fellows lodges through out the city. Of those twenty, almost half were located in North Portland and inner Northeast. To the pioneers of St. Johns, University Park, Portsmouth and Kenton, the Odd Fellows offered them services and security. When a member was sick and could not work, the Odd Fellows paid their wages. If a member's house caught fire, the Odd Fellows would provide them food and lodging. When a member died, Odd Fellows performed the burial, and cared for their survivors.

Membership in the Odd Fellows provided the pioneers of North Portland with the "best safeguards against the adversities of life." It also provided a very intimate and personal sense of community. Unlike an insurance company, Odd Fellows took care of each other with direct, hands-on assistance. They pooled their money and resources to help each other during times of need. From 1889 to 1913, eight Odd Fellows lodges were instituted in the North Portland area to meet the needs of these early residents.

With the rapid modernization and growth taking place in North Portland today, there is an urgent call to preserve our unique history. In response to that call, the St. Johns Museum is being formed. The Odd Fellows are proud to be a part of that history, and to partner with the new Museum to preserve and cultivate the rich heritage of St. Johns and North Portland.

Keep Portland Odd!

Danzan Ryu, a Traditional Style of Jujitsu

North Portland KaishinKai offers a traditional alternative to the current trend of MMA fighting at many Jujitsu schools.

Founded in 1927 by Hawaiian Henry Seshiro Okazaki, Danzan Ryu combines aspects of judo, karate, wrestling and more with aspects of massage and eastern methods of healing. Danzan Ryu also has a strong focus on learning to fall, and working with one's partner safely.

Danzan Ryu uses a method of teaching in which advanced students transmit knowledge to newer students; this allows new students to begin at any time.

The club's instructor, Sensei Ryan McDaniel, began studying Danzan Ryu in 2003 under Sue and Ron Jennings from Grand Mound, Washington.

After moving to Portland in 2009, McDaniel-sensei started North Portland Kaishinkai while he was training for his black belt exam, which he passed in 2010.

According to McDaniel-sensei, Danzan Ryu Jujitsu is a great way to stay in shape, learn effective self-defense methods, meet new people, build physical skills, and most importantly, build mental confidence. The tools you learn in Danzan Ryu Jujitsu will help you in everyday life.

His assistant instructors bring a wide base of knowledge from various backgrounds to create a diverse, welcoming environment. "This is fitting," according to McDaniel-sensei, "as the name Kaishinkai translates to a gathering of open minds. So no matter who you are or what your physical abilities are, North Portland Kaishinkai will make a place for you."

McDaniel-sensei credits Danzan Ryu as an important factor in his recovery from being hit by a drunk driver in February, 2007. McDaniel states that the mental and physical discipline that he learned in studying Danzan Ryu Jujitsu made it possible for him to stay active and engaged in the community.
