David Scheer, Aikido Teacher at Peninsula Odd Fellows

**O&E:** Thank you, David, for making the time to allow Odds and Ends interview you. We know your schedule is really busy.

O&E: How long have you been an Aikido instructor, or Sensei?

David: I started teaching as a student instructor at Montavilla Community Center in 1997.

In Yoshokai Aikido, someone who wants to be an instructor has to learn the Yoshokai teaching method. You do this by studying under the guidance of a fullycertified instructor. There is also an instructor's course called Kenshu. It's an eighty hour course with a mid-term and a final. I was promoted to assistant instructor in

and became fully-2000. а accredited instructor in 2005.

O&E: You teach Aikido at the Odd Fellows Lodge. How long have you been teaching there?

David: I've been teaching at the Odd Fellows since 2007.

**O&E:** Why did you choose to teach at Peninsula Odd Fellows Lodge?

**David:** To be honest, it wasn't my idea. My parents were distraught because the Odd Fellows lodge was about to close. There weren't enough members to keep the lodge going. Society was changing. Pancake breakfasts and formal dances were not enough to attract new members anymore.

At the same time, my club at Montavilla was the fastest-growing Yoshokai Aikido school in the country. My parents asked me to move the club to the Odd Fellows the lodge would have something to attract younger members.

I resisted at first, because I didn't want to lose the good thing I had going at Montavilla. However, when I saw how passionate my parents were about saving their lodge, I realized that there had to be something special about being an Odd Fellow that I just never saw before. That's when I decided to take a leap of faith and start teaching at the lodge.


**O&E:** Is that when you became an Odd Fellow?

David: No. I became an Odd Fellow when I turned 16, so technically I've been a member for 38 years. I say technically, because I quit going to meetings by the time I was 18. I thought the lodge was boring. I liked all the charity they did, but I was young and wanted to have fun. The events they had at the lodge just weren't exciting to me.

**O&E:** Has Peninsula Odd Fellows changed much since you first joined?

### **Donation Drive for New Avenues for Youth**



Peninsula Odd Fellows Lodge #128 is sponsoring a donation drive for New Avenues for Youth, to collect basic household necessities for individuals transitioning out of foster care and into their own apartments.

New Avenues for Youth provides services to at-risk and homeless youth, from supporting basic needs like meals and counseling to opportunities providing for education. job training, employment, and housing. Recently, New Avenues for Youth partnered with Bridge Meadows, an inter-generational community in Portsmouth, that has nine family homes and twenty-seven apartments for elders. Bridge Meadows facilitate aims to inter-generational relationships, build and seeks to place, permanence and purpose for foster youth, adoptive parents, and elders.

In partnership with Bridge Meadows, New Avenues will operate the Dorothy Lemelson House & New Meadows program, an innovative housing community for youth transitioning out of foster care. New Meadows and Bridge Meadows are just 600 feet apart; building these two communities so close to one another is intentional, and meant to facilitate long-lasting relationships between elders and youth. New Meadows will provide a space where youth can gain the life skills necessary for independence, with the support of the program staff and the Bridge Meadows community.

When the youth move into apartments in New Meadows, the goal is to get them off to a good start, and supply them with basic household necessities. Peninsula Odd Fellows are sponsoring a donation drive for New Meadows residents throughout September and early October. Donations can be dropped off Monday through Friday, 12:00-7:00pm at Peninsula Lodge, 4834 N. Lombard St., Monday-Friday, through October 12th.

A celebration to mark the successful end of the drive and all of the generous donations will be held on Sunday, October 14th,

from 12:00-4:00pm at Peninsula Lodge. Additional donations can be brought to the October 14th celebration.

#### What is Capoeira?

Capoeira is a Brazilian martial art that incorporates elements of dance, acrobatics, and music. Originating from the African slaves in Brazil as a movement of resistance against oppression, slaves would train together and have to disguise their training as a dance. Though Capoeira is in many ways a fight, practitioners call it a game, played between two people within a circle of spectators (or roda), who, through their singing and clapping, give their energy to the pair in the middle.

Capoeira classes at Peninsula Lodge are held every Tuesday and

> evening, Thursday starting at 7:30pm. These classes are lead Mestre Dilaho. Mestre Dilaho is from Itabuna, in the Brazilian state of Bahia. He has been teaching Capoeira classes for 30 years, and is respected in Capoeira circles around the world for his techniques and for his knowledge.



There are truly so many reasons to start doing Capoeira that if one asked every practitioner, each answer would be different. However, here's a short list of reasons to give Capoeira a try:

- Increase fitness, flexibility, strength, and endurance
- Develop rhythm, creativity, and self-expression
- Experience elements of Brazilian culture

This popular event features a variety of games, at which children can win candy and toys. The games cost \$1.00 and vary in difficulty, so every child can experience the thrill of a challenge and still leave a winner. Snacks

The parent-teacher organizations receive an equal share for each child that attends from their school. The more children that attend from a given school, the larger the check that the school will receive.

**David:** In many ways it's completely different. A couple years after I started teaching Aikido at the lodge, we added Hula classes. From there everything picked up steam. Now we have three different martial arts, all kinds of dance classes, a group called Interplay, and three theater companies. Each and every group that joins the lodge brings new energy and life.

To be fair, though, I felt that same energy when I used to come to the lodge as a child. It was a different generation with different interests, and the lodge was different because of it. That's what makes membership here so special. We don't just belong to the lodge; we own it. We decide how the building will be run, and what activities will take place in it. We pick the charities we are going to support, and decide how to support them. It's very empowering.

**O&E:** In your busy schedule, what do you do when spare time is available?

**David:** Hula! I always wanted to learn, but had no idea how I would find a teacher, or how I would fit it into my schedule. Having a Hula instructor in the lodge solved both those issues. Three times a week I take a midday break from teaching Aikido and go study Hula. I love it!
